In the past year, in addition to many other significant advancements, a thorough Sport Model Review has been conducted, building out an objective and reliable structure for critically evaluating our sport offerings. In addition, the collective U SPORTS (made up of 56 member institutions together with a national office) has made great progress on a new Strategic Plan. This Plan is being built on an exhaustive consultation process involving university presidents, athletic directors, conference offices, student-athletes, NSOs, MSOs, and more. It will be an outstanding document that I know will be an important resource to my successor and to the organization as a whole.

While there is certainly some wistfulness to signing off for the final time as the Chair of the Board of U SPORTS, I look forward to watching the new Chair and Directors continue to build upon the promising foundation that we have developed. With your passion, dedication, and teamwork, the university sports system will only continue to grow – I am proud of what we have done, and emboldened by what I know U SPORTS can do. Thank you for allowing me to play a part.

On behalf of the Board of Directors and Staff of U SPORTS, I am pleased to present our Annual Report for 2018.

It has now been two (2) full academic cycles since I started with CIS / U SPORTS. During this time a great deal has been accomplished both at the Board of Director level and at the operational level of the organization. This past year, one of our priorities has been to improve the way in which the National Office integrates digital media and statistics, which has resulted in significant increases in online traffic at all levels, but in particular with the redesigned U SPORTS website. We have taken a more strategic approach to segmenting some of the digital content of the members, conferences and National Office, while at the same time aggregating league statistics, which has generated a strong platform for all of university sport in Canada. A significant amount of work has been put forth on developing a new Sport Model, developing a stronger business plan for our International department, building a new Strategic Plan and implementing a more sophisticated commercial model. Although some of these projects are not yet complete, these efforts will enhance the frameworks from which U SPORTS will continue to advance university sport in Canada.

This past year also saw the continued evolution of the U SPORTS Central platform. Our vision for gaining a more evidence-based understanding of our university sport system, improving our decision-making, and creating efficiencies through the use of an online portal, is beginning to take form. In addition to the modules that have already launched successfully, more are being developed and implemented, which will further enhance the effectiveness with which our office can deliver our administrative and operational tasks. It is our hope that the value proposition will benefit not only the National Office, but also our conferences and of course our members. Once they are fully operational, U SPORTS Central and Basecamp will ensure that information can flow seamlessly between all levels of our governance and administration. These projects are in their early stages of development, and our staff would like to thank those within the membership who have been

instrumental in moving these projects forward. The continued support and involvement of our membership is paramount.

In closing, one of the significant challenges of holding the role of President & CEO of such a large, complicated, and geographically expansive organization is the ability to maintain engagement and retain leadership and vision in an ever-changing environment. This organization requires a dedicated staff, and no one is more proud of the work and accomplishments of our team than I am. This organization also relies heavily on the extraordinary volunteer contribution of our members, made all the more amazing since each of our members have significant projects and challenges on their own campuses to manage and lead. I would like to thank all levels of U SPORTS Membership from across Canada who have dedicated their time and effort to sitting on our Board, participating in one or more of our many Committees, taking part in the activities of our International program, hosting or going to National Championships, or attending ad hoc meetings throughout the year. U SPORTS does not exist without this tremendous network of support and leadership that our universities from across Canada provide. I would like to close with a particular note of gratitude to Dr. Michael Mahon, who has not only provided the highest level of leadership to this organization over his tenure, but who has empowered a vision for the future that I believe will both inspire and challenge our university sport leaders across Canada for many years to come.

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Canada's university sport brand seeing success one year after U SPORTS launch

A new editorial strategy – rich content that brings to life the compelling stories of the 14,000 student-athletes – coupled with the production of additional and higher quality graphic and video content, has enabled USPORTS.ca and its social channels to widen its scope and attract a larger audience.

Starting with the U SPORTS Correspondent Program (studentjournalist storytelling) at the beginning of the 2016-17 season, USPORTS.ca has introduced a higher number and more diverse profile of contributors, while also showcasing exciting new social media initiatives.

> At this year's Panda Game, the annual football clash between cross-town rivals Carleton and Ottawa (read more below), Kenzie Lalonde, a former women's hockey standout with the Mount Allison Mounties and current U SPORTS social media host, covered all the action from the sidelines, delivering unique, in-depth coverage of the event.

As well, during the 2016 Uteck and Mitchell Bowls, as well as other national championships, student-athletes and teams were given the opportunity to take over the U SPORTS social media accounts – a


chance for fans of Canadian university sport to get an 'insider's view' of the events.

U SPORTS' use of social media as a vehicle to not only tell the stories of its student-athletes - especially at national championships – but also to distribute these stories to today's technological-savvy students, has resulted in a tremendous boost in key metrics areas since the rebrand.

On the field, U SPORTS athletes and teams are standing out at home and on the world stage, including BLG U SPORTS Athletes of the Year winners Kylie Masse, Andrew Buckley, Philippe Maillet and Arielle Roy-Peticlerc.

Masse, a swimming star at the University of Toronto became an Olympic medalist – tying for bronze at the 2016 Summer Games – and world record-holder in the 100m backstroke, a feat she achieved last July at the FINA world championships in Hungary. Her triumph broke an eight-year-old record while becoming the first female Canadian swimmer to ever win a world title.

Buckley, a two-time Hec Crighton recipient with the University



"It gives me goose bumps, I can't wait to play," says Université de Montréal volleyball player Marie-Alex Bélanger in *Behind The Brand*, a six-minute video showcasing the U SPORTS rebrand which was shown at the 2016 press conferences. "I watched this and told myself, 'Okay, I can't wait to go back to the gym and train with my team."

Since the rebrand announcement, collaborations and synergies with the CFL, the NHL (Declaration of Principles initiative), and various National Sport Organizations (NSOs) such as Swimming Canada and Canada Basketball for the Summer Universiade for instance, or with Tennis Canada and Golf Canada for the Canadian University Championships, have further solidified U SPORTS' reputation as a highlyrespected sports leader.

The excitement created by the rebrand unveiling – for student-athletes and fans

alike – continues to resonate with followers of Canadian university sports, including through the revamped USPORTS.ca website and its connected social media channels (Twitter, Instagram, Facebook and YouTube).

Introduced on Sept. 14 as the latest phase in the U SPORTS rebrand, the new-look USPORTS.ca delivers an appealing digital experience through numerous aesthetic enhancements and an exciting new editorial strategy, combining to offer a comprehensive and engaging user experience.

"Our goal was to make USPORTS.ca a fan-friendly, easy-tonavigate website, where we could bring the stories of our great student-athletes to the forefront, while also delivering key sports information and news from the country's 56 schools," said Ken Saint-Eloy, U SPORTS Senior Manager of Marketing and Communications, of the website that was selected as Site of the Day by awwwards.com on Sept. 27, which had 120,000 visitors in its first month. "Our social properties also reflect that commitment to providing a first-rate experience for the thousands of loyal fans of Canadian university sport, and beyond."

of Calgary Dinos, played the last two seasons as a quarterback with the Calgary Stampeders before retiring to pursue medical school. In 2016, he became the first Canadian to pass for a touchdown in the Grey Cup since Russ Jackson in 1969.

Maillet (University of New Brunswick), the 2017 U SPORTS men's hockey Player of the Year, University Cup champion and MVP, signed a pro contract with the Ontario Reign, the American Hockey League (AHL) affiliate of the Los Angeles Kings.

Roy-Petitclerc, a soccer star at Université Laval, and last year's female BLG Award recipient alongside Maillet, was selected as flag-bearer at the 2017 Summer Universiade in Chinese Taipei, leading a delegation of 387 Canadians into the Opening Ceremony. The former Rouge et Or star played for ASPTT Albi in the top French league this season.

In the international program, gymnast and Olympian Ellie Black (Dalhousie University) became the first Canadian gymnast to win a world all-around medal, taking silver at the 2017 world championships in Montreal. U SPORTS also sent and fully managed five teams to the Summer Universiade for the first time. The men's and women's soccer and volleyball teams, along with the men's basketball squad sent to Taipei over the summer were all run in-house instead of their respective NSOs as in past. Team Canada came home with 13 medals from the Games – four gold, five silver and four bronze.

On the gridiron, football player Antony Auclair (Université Laval) made the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' 53-man roster.

Schools are also making their mark with notable achievements, including the Carleton men's basketball squad, who were

defending seven-time national champions until this season, continuing to shine on the hardcourt, both on home soil and against NCAA competition. Meanwhile, the 2017 Panda Game – a rivalry that originally kicked-off in 1955 - was played in front of a modern-day Panda Game-record crowd of 24,420.

Other marquee matchups that annually draw top attendance across the country include the Crowchild Classic (Calgary/Mount Royal) and Steel Blade (Brock/Guelph) men's hockey events, the Capital Hoops Classic basketball game between Ottawa and Carleton, and the North America Challenge between McMaster and Ohio State in men's volleyball.

U SPORTS hockey also continues to grow in both popularity and on-ice success. In December, the U SPORTS All-Stars – featuring the best players across the country – swept Canada's National Junior Team Prospects in a two-game series for the first time. Last summer, the best U SPORTS women's hockey players defeated Canada's National Women's Development Team. On Nov. 13, former University of Alberta hockey head coach Clare Drake was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame as part of its 2017 class.

All of these achievements are a testament to the talent level demonstrated by Canadian student-athletes and the programs available to them at their U SPORTS institutions.

"We look forward to continuing to shine the light on the outstanding accomplishments and personal triumphs of the student-athletes," said Graham Brown, President and CEO of U SPORTS. "Their stories will no doubt strike a chord with everyone who reads them on USPORTS.ca." \clubsuit





Governance

U SPORTS is a collective entity comprised of 56 member institutions from across Canada, four conferences, and a national office located in Richmond Hill, Ont. The U SPORTS national office consists of 14 full-time staff, and is guided by a Board of Directors made up of four university presidents (one from each conference), four athletic directors (one from each conference), and a member-atlarge. The active involvement of university presidents in the governance of sport is a relatively new phenomenon, and has helped U SPORTS build a strong relationship with Universities Canada, a membership organization providing university presidents with a unified voice for higher education, research, and innovation. The increased involvement of university presidents has helped U SPORTS view its programs from an entirely different perspective, and has enabled U SPORTS leadership to present to Universities Canada and advocate for the role sports plays on university campuses across the country.

UNIVERSITY CUP RENAMED Former Governor General David Johnston

Former Governor General David Johnston 'humbled' by University Cup honour

ormer Governor General David Johnston's love affair with hockey is no secret. Johnston hails from the hockey rich, steel-producing town of Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., where he played with the likes of Tony and Phil Esposito, now Hockey Hall of Famers. Just over 50 years later, his life has taken a radically different route than his old teammates.

It started with a serendipitous encounter with a Harvard University alumni in his hometown. It was the late 1950s and Harvard was seeking to expand the student demographic beyond blueblood offspring and add students from different socioeconomic backgrounds who excelled academically. The fresh-faced son of a nurse and manager of a local hardware store, went on to earn a scholarship to study law at the renowned lvy League school in Massachusetts.

It was at Harvard under the guidance of his late hockey coach Cooney Weiland where he learned lifelong lessons that would contribute to his future academic and public service career success.

"If you're involved in a team sport where there is dependence on one another, you

realize that leadership is recognizing the total dependence of the people around you," he says.

Johnston describes Weiland as an "outstanding teacher" who treated him like a son.

What he took away from his time playing hockey at Harvard and his relationship with Weiland was not simply mentorship or teaching but "friendship and family."

While playing for the Crimson, Johnston captained the team to three Ivy League titles and was named first team All-America, All-Ivy League and All-Eastern College Athletic Conference, back to back years.

After graduating in 1963, he went on to pursue a law degree at Cambridge University, forgoing a tryout with the Boston Bruins of the NHL. Since then, his career in academia and the public service has spanned five decades, seven years of which he spent as the Governor General of Canada. He has held posts at top Canadian universities including as the dean of law at Western University, principal and vice-chancellor of McGill University and as the president of the Unviersity of Waterloo.

Supporting him throughout his career are his wife Sharon, whom he met in high school, and their five daughters. All five of which he says have played hockey in some capacity. His daughter Sharon Jr. even followed in his footsteps and studied at Harvard and captained the women's hockey team.

During his time as Governor General, he used his position to recognize the academic and athletic achievements of student-athletes across the country. In 2013, Johnston founded the Governor General's Academic All-Canadian Commendation and since then, every year the top male and female student-athletes from each U SPORTS conference are chosen as the Top 8 Academic All-Canadians and honoured by the Governor General with a ceremony at Rideau Hall. U SPORTS introduced the Academic All-Canadian award in 1988 to recognize student-athletes who play on a varsity team and achieve an academic average of 80 per cent or better. Among those student-athletes who have been named to the Top 8 are Andrew Buckley, former backup quarterback for the Calgary Stampeders, as well as Sasha Gollish, a middledistance runner who captured bronze in the 1,500m at the Pan Am Games in Toronto

"(Athletics) demonstrate that excellence in one sphere of activity produces excellence in another sphere of activity," he says. "It's not only transferable, it's contagious."


While Johnston's name will not go down in NHL record books, perhaps as he once hoped, he has instead left an indelible mark upon Canadian university sport and exemplifies the role that sport plays in achieving success inside and outside of the classroom.

With the U SPORTS men's hockey championship trophy – the University Cup – now named in his honour, he joins past governor generals like Lord Stanley and Adrienne Clarkson – namesakes of the NHL's Stanley Cup and the Canadian Women's Hockey League's (CWHL) Clarkson Cup respectively – in having his name grace a hockey trophy.


"I'm quite humbled by it all," he says. "I love hockey, I love sports, and I love the association of the Office of the Governor General with sports and physical activity and in particular hockey."


As for his hopes for university sport in the future, he says it's twofold.

"I would like to work very hard to see sport as a universal opportunity," he says, and for all young Canadians to see "sport as the key to healthy living and a healthy life." \clubsuit

AUSTIN-MATTHEWS AWARD

Former University of Manitoba athletic director Coleen Dufresne, for her outstanding contribution to interuniversity sport, as demonstrated by long-term commitment and leadership as a coach, director, chairperson and/or executive committee member at the local, provincial and/or national levels.

Dufresne retired in August 2016, after serving as athletic director for the Bisons since 2001. Prior to her executive role, she was head coach of the women's basketball team at Manitoba (1984-2001) and UNB

(1980-84), winning three U SPORTS championships in 1988, 1996 and 1997 and earning national Coach of the year honours in 1983, 1988 and 1998. Dufresne has also attended six Universides, a pair of World University Championships, and has served on the FISU Executive Committee as well as the U SPORTS Board of Directors.





The University of Toronto's late Adam Zimmerman, whose participation in university athletics exemplified the ideals and purposes of interuniversity athletics and amateur sport.

A former Varsity Blues football player who graduated in 1949, Zimmerman was a founding member of the Friends of Football Alumni group, which led the fight to help save the University of Toronto's football program. He later became a chartered accountant, serving as president and vice chairman of Noranda Mines, where

he made his mark as a leader in the business world. Zimmerman was also the founder of the University of Northern British Columbia (UNBC), a long-time director of SickKids and an Officer of the Order of Canada.

Fourteen U SPORTS alumni bring home medals at PyeongChang Olympics

PYEONGCHANG, SOUTH KOREA February 9-25, 2018

John Morris and Kaitlyn Lawes, a pair of U SPORTS alumni, made Olympic history at the PyeongChang Olympics when they captured gold in the inaugural mixed curling event. It was the first time the two played together on an international stage, though neither was unfamiliar with the high stakes of the Olympic Games.

Morris entered competition already an Olympic gold medalist in men's curling from Vancouver 2010, while Lawes also had gold in women's curling from the Sochi 2014 Games. Despite being veterans of the team game, mixed curling was a departure from the familiar group-style of play both players were used to.

"Mixed doubles is a completely different sport than team curling. It's so much fun," Morris says.

"One of the things that it's really done for me the last few years is really instill some of the fun back in the game, and it brings me back to my roots of curling."

The first test the duo faced was at the Olympic trials. Rachel Homan was originally slated to be Morris' partner but was no longer available after her rink qualified to represent Canada in the women's event. That's where Lawes, a Manitoba Bisons alum and third for Jennifer Jones' team, came in.

"I was very fortunate that she was able to play with me in the trials," Morris says. "It was a quick learning curve; we needed to hone our skills a little bit out of the gate and develop our game plan and strategy."

The duo gelled quickly, a testament to the five years of becoming familiar with each other while playing on tour. At the Olympics, Morris and Lawes put on an impressive performance. They went 8-1 en route to gold, losing only their first match to Norway, whom they later defeated in the semis to advance to the final against Switzerland. In the gold medal match, Morris and Lawes began to pull away from the Swiss, after capturing two points at the end of the fifth end. Switzerland ultimately conceded at the end of the sixth after Canada took a commanding 10-3 lead. Their success was a bright spot for Canadian curling, as both the men's and women's teams struggled with consistency and accuracy against a strong field, failing to medal in the process.

Curling has been part of both of Morris and Lawes' lives since they were small children. For Lawes, it started at four, when she played at family fun bonspiel, while Morris remembers a moment from the Navy Curling Club in Ottawa.

"I started when I was five years old," he says. "My dad put me on a curling rock and threw me down the ice!"

The sport followed him into his teens and twenties where he played four years for the Laurier Golden Hawks and picked up some cooking skills in the process.

"It was really good at helping me develop because there was a lot of really good teams that we ran into and gave us some really good games. It allowed me to develop my own skills," Morris says. "We've had such a good pedigree of curlers at Laurier – before me, (it was) Paul Webster, who's now part of the national training program. (There were also) Danielle Inglis and Holly Nicoll – some great curlers there that have really helped developed the program into what it is now."

Morris was a multi-sport athlete at Laurier, also playing varsity baseball and flag football. Since he graduated in 2003, the Golden Hawks have become a curling powerhouse, capturing five OUA and two U SPORTS men's championships. Lawes' nephew, Connor, currently plays for the team.

Now a firefighter with Rocky View Fire Services outside of Calgary, Morris says during his time in Waterloo, Ont., he learned valuable life lessons out of the classroom and off the rink


"One thing I really learned at Laurier, it taught me to be a really great human being and it taught me some really good life skills because I had never lived away from home," Morris says. "It taught me a lot about how to interact socially, and just really good life skills."

U SPORTS ALUMNI BRING HOME HARDWARE FROM PYEONGCHANG

Lawes and Morris weren't the only U SPORTS alumni who brought back hardware from South Korea – of the 62 who either competed for or attended a U SPORTS institution, 14 brought home medals.

Covering all the podium achievements for Team Canada was another notable U SPORTS alumni: Former Laval Rouge et Or and current Kansas City Chiefs offensive guard Laurent Duvernay-Tardif served as a broadcaster for Radio Canada, the French-language equivalent of the CBC.

Duvernay-Tardif, who completed his third season with the Chiefs in 2017, will graduate from medical school at Laval this spring.

Of the over 5,000 athletes who competed at the Commonwealth Games, there were 80 Canadians with U SPORTS ties out of the 282-member delegation who represented their country this year. The biggest U SPORTS impact was on the women's field hockey and men's basketball rosters. The Canadian women's field hockey team had 18 players, with 15 coming from U SPORTS programs. In men's basketball, every player on the 12-man roster came from U SPORTS schools, including this year's Final 8 championship MVP, David Kapinga (Calgary), and fellow Championship All-Stars Manny Diressa (Ryerson) and Mambi Diawara (Calgary).

Men's Hockey All-Star Series

U SPORTS All-Stars the perfect test for Team Canada en route to junior golden dreams

Team swept the Canadian World Junior prospects in their annual two-game series – an event that both teams say was for the benefit of the World Junior squad.

"Our objective is actually not to win," says U SPORTS President and CEO Graham Brown. "Our objective is to give the World Juniors a really good team that they can use to help select their final team...We want to see the World Juniors be successful."

While most wouldn't think to pair athletic success with losses, Shawn Bullock, senior manager of hockey operations at Hockey Canada, says his team's pair of defeats to Brown's U SPORTS squad were "outstanding," as they helped determine which of the best Under-20 players to pick for the Canadian World Junior side.

"The skill level, the speed, and the style of play that they were presenting was exactly what we needed to create an evaluation environment and expose some of our players that unfortunately didn't make the program," says Bullock of the U SPORTS All-Stars.

This competitive yet supportive relationship between the two sides – which holds strong on the female side as well, as the best U SPORTS women's hockey players annually take part in Hockey Canada's Summer Showcase each August – has been ongoing since 1988, with the U SPORTS All-Star Team serving as part of the Junior Team's selection camp since 2015.

In the first year of the contests, U SPORTS took the first win, beating the Canadian hopefuls 5-4 in a shootout in Toronto. The next day, the Junior prospects got their redemption, beating U SPORTS 5-0. In 2016, the World Juniors swept the All-Stars, winning 5-3 on Day 1 and 3-0 on Day 2, with both games held in Boisbriand, Que.

This year in St. Catharine's, Ont., following the Team Canada hopefuls' 2016 success, Hockey Canada asked U SPORTS to up the challenge.

Typically, when the All-Star Team is chosen, the coaching staff needs to meet a specific quota, with a certain number of players coming from each conference. This year, Hockey Canada asked





that U SPORTS scrap those geographical requirements and simply pick the top athletes in the country.

"They just picked the best players," says Bullock of the selection changes. "They pushed our guys...and that's what we wanted."

In addition to having more "freedom and flexibility" in picking his roster, U SPORTS head coach Brad Peddle of StFX – along with assistants Mark Howell of Calgary, Trevor Stienburg of Saint Mary's and Patrick Grandmaître of Ottawa – made a point of adding more practices as well as team-building activities, such as visiting Niagara Falls and taking in a Buffalo Sabres game, to this year's preparations.

As Peddle intended, these changes led to improved results for the U SPORTS All-Stars.

In the first contest of this year's series, an early goal in the first period by Alberta forward Luke Philp and two empty-net goals at the end of the third allowed the U SPORTS athletes to secure a 3-0 win over their younger opponents.

The second match was much closer, as the two teams were tied 2-2 then 3-3 in the final period. Ultimately, though, with just 6.5 seconds on the clock, Alberta defenceman Jason Fram snuck one in for a 4-3 victory over the Junior prospects.

"We're really proud of the group," says Peddle, who served as U SPORTS' assistant coach on last year's All-Star bench. "They really bought into how we had to play, and I think you saw, over the two games, a committed group in terms of just leaving it on the ice and playing with pride."

Regardless of the series results and of the three-year, backand-forth rivalry, both sides of the ice insist that the U SPORTS-Hockey Canada relationship is mutually beneficial and important.

"It's a great partnership that we have," says Brown, providing the U SPORTS perspective. "We invest heavily to make that team successful, and Hockey Canada invests in us."

Bullock agrees, describing U SPORTS efforts to help select the Canadian Juniors as "perfect" and "tremendous."

Following the series, Hockey Canada was able to narrow the

players from 33 to 27, nearly finalizing the roster ahead of the IIHF World Junior Championship, where they captured their first gold since 2015.

While these decisions are the key reason why this series was established, the games also help do something else: inform sports fans of the quality of U SPORTS athletics.

"They pushed our 18, 19-year-old athletes that are considered the best in the country, and in some cases, the best in the world," says Bullock of the U SPORTS All-Stars, whom he says does not get the respect they deserve. "They pushed (us) right to the limits and won both games. So, I hope people took note."

Following the pair of victories, U SPORTS was trending on social media while several news outlets reported the results throughout the country, suggesting Canadian university athletics may finally be getting the attention it's proven to deserve.

When Brown began his role as U SPORTS President and CEO just over two and a half years ago, it was his goal to make university sports in Canada more "relevant." While he says the recent hockey publicity will help, he and the U SPORTS team are always striving to do more.

"It's not going to be a home run; it's not going to be one thing that does it. It's every year you got to keep working harder," he says, referring to the organization's need to continue putting on events like the All-Star series.

Brown emphasizes that his team is committed to increasing awareness about the quality of U SPORTS athletics, while simultaneously nurturing relationships with Canada's national sports organizations, like Rugby Canada, Canada Basketball, and the CFL.

The U SPORTS leader has his eye on all Canadian sports, but when it comes to the Canadian Christmas tradition of supporting the World Juniors in the IIHF Championship competition, Brown is proud to have shared in the team's glory.

"(I) believe the U SPORTS hockey team...played a small role in (Team Canada's) victory," he says. •



Women's Hockey Development Camp

U SPORTS Women's Hockey All-Stars gain Hockey Canada experience at Summer Showcase

or a second consecutive year, the U SPORTS Women's Hockey All-Stars headed to Calgary, Alta., to train and compete at Hockey Canada's Summer Showcase from Aug. 5-13, 2017.

Consisting of 21 players from across the nation, the showcase included on and off-ice training from Hockey Canada, practices and games against Japan's National Women's team as well as Hockey Canada's Development (U22) Team.

Finishing with a 2-2 record at last year's program, the U SPORTS All-Stars earned a pair of wins against Japan, followed by their first-ever win over Team Canada.

The U SPORTS roster showcased some of the best studentathletes in the country, including 2017 Championship MVP Lindsey Post (Alberta), Player of the Year Sarah Bujold (StFX), Rookie of the Year, Tricia Deguire (McGill), and six All-Canadians.

Out of the 21 U SPORTS players invited to the camp, three players were able to use the Summer Showcase as a platform to further their careers in hockey, going on to the Canadian Women's Hockey League (CWHL) Draft where they were all selected by the Calgary Inferno. Post, Kelty Apperson (St. Thomas) and Kelly Murray (UBC) all made their professional hockey debuts this past season in the CWHL. Post would finish the season with the fourth-best goals-against-average (2.21) in the league,

while Apperson and Murray tallied nine and eight points, respectively with the Inferno.

Goaltender Amelia Boughn (UBC) and forward Olivia Atkinson (McGill) also attended the camp, invited to participate for Team Canada. Boughn played two games for the Red and White, stopping all 20 shots she faced, while Atkinson tallied a pair of goals in four games.

Through this partnership with Hockey Canada, U SPORTS hopes to continue the development of women's hockey. The U SPORTS All-Stars are set to participate in their third consecutive Hockey Canada Showcase this summer.

nitiated in 2003, the East-West Bowl showcases U SPORTS players who, in the majority of cases, will be eligible for the following year's CFL draft.

The West team is mostly made up of U SPORTS football players from Canada West and Ontario University Athletics (OUA) schools, except Carleton, Ottawa and Queen's, which play for the East squad. The rest of the East team features players from Atlantic University Sport (AUS) and Réseau du sport étudiant du Québec (RSEQ) schools.

In the 2018 edition, Manitoba Bisons running back Jamel Lyles scored the game-winning 18-yard touchdown with 2:12 remaining on the clock, to lead Team West to a 15-14 victory. It was the third straight victory for the West team and improved their record to 10-6.

The contest capped a week of celebration for Canadian football, after 56 U SPORTS standouts were selected out of 69 total picks (81.2 per cent), nine days earlier during the 2018 CFL draft.

Shoot for the Cure

U SPORTS women's basketball programs raised **\$100,961.31** for the Canadian Cancer Society (CCS) in 2017-18, thanks to the 11th edition of the annual Shoot For The Cure initiative.

An additional **\$17,996.85** was amassed by schools that elected to donate their fundraised money to local or provincial organizations, bringing this season's Shoot For The Cure overall total to **\$118,958.16** and the 11-year total to **\$1,252,516.77** since the initiative was launched in 2007-08 to raise awareness and money to fight the deadly disease.

For the seventh straight season, all 47 U SPORTS women's hoops programs participated by holding one or numerous fundraising games or activities over the course of the campaign.



Heightened Minimum Championship Bid Standards

In January, U SPORTS announced its hosts for the 2019-2021 U SPORTS Championships in men's and women's basketball and 2019-2020 men's and women's ice hockey. This marked the culmination of a new bid process that emphasized increased minimum standards.

Basketball and hockey are two of U SPORTS' most prestigious championships for which a number of high-quality bids were presented. Included, was an integrated bid with men's and women's basketball through a joint partnership between the University of Ottawa, Carleton University and the Ottawa Sports & Entertainment Group (OSEG). This bid was identified as an innovative approach for a sport enjoying tremendous success at both the grassroots and high-performance levels across Canada. Dalhousie University (2019 men's basketball), St. Francis Xavier University (2021 men's basketball), Ryerson University (2019 women's basketball), Queen's University (2021 women's basketball), University of Lethbridge (2019 men's hockey), Acadia University (2020 men's hockey), and UPEI (2019 and 2020 women's hockey) will host the other U SPORTS national championships.

Host Orientation Workshop

Held at the University of Toronto, the first U SPORTS host orientation workshop was an opportunity for schools playing host to championships between 2018 and 2021 to understand national office expectations and discuss minimum requirements and new standards under the U SPORTS brand. The two-day meeting and conference was also a chance to share ideas and best practices with colleagues, as well as hear and meet with professionals from the sports industry – all with the common goal of hosting successful championships in the coming years.

On Day 1, U SPORTS departments presented updates and recommendations to the new championship hosts, with special focuses on events, coordination with the national office, marketing and promotion, communications, social media, livestreaming and partnerships. For the remainder of the conference, hosts had a chance to hear from representatives from key companies and sport organizations on how to run a successful event beyond the field of play.

Presenters included NeuLion, Sports Canada TV, the Canadian Sport Tourism Alliance (CSTA), Sport & Entertainment Atlantic (S|E|A), Maple Leaf Sports and Entertainment (MLSE), the the Canadian Football League (CFL), Canadian Olympic Committee (COC), Stadium Digital and IMG, all of whom served as great resources to the hosts.

Representatives from 14 host schools of 13 different championship events over the next three years attended the inaugural event – spanning athletic and associate athletic directors, as well as marketing, events and sports information / communications staff.

FISU Volunteer Leader Academy

U SPORTS sent two student representatives to Kazan, Russia for the 2017 FISU Volunteer Leaders Academy. This educational program took place at the Volga Region State Academy of Physical Culture, Sport and Tourism and was a week-long program which included lectures, roundtable discussion, networking opportunities and great guest speakers in the industry. The event was divided into two main components; the International Day of University Sport and the FISU 2018 World University Championships. The U SPORTS Canadian delegation reported an overall great experience in travelling to Kazan, networking with prestigious global executives in the sport industry and being indulged in global discussion around university sports.

2017 FISU 3x3 Basketball World University League

U SPORTS International sent a men's and women's team to the 2017 FISU 3x3 Basketball World University League (WUL) final in Xiamen, China. In total, 32 teams (16 teams of each gender) participated in the event. On the women's side, members of the Regina Cougars went 6-1, finishing with silver, while on the men's side, players from the McGill Redmen went 6-0 and claimed bronze.

Sport Review

U SPORTS has resurrected a draft Sport Model that was previously led by the Sport Committee. Bob Copeland of McLaren Global Sport Solutions Inc. was hired to review the current offering of U SPORTS-sanctioned sports through data collection, analysis and extensive consultation, with a vision to create a new sport model aimed at advancing U SPORTS within the organization's new mission to "provide and promote inclusive and exceptional opportunities for student-athletes to reach their academic and athletic potential."

The model's objectives include determining criteria on how to add new, remove or re-categorize sports sanctioned by the national office. The proposed new model is based on extensive consultation, including surveys and meetings with the membership, university presidents, National and Multisport Organizations, as well as conference offices. Oversight of the process and input into the model was provided by an Ad Hoc Committee chaired by Dr. Alan Wildeman, President of the University of Windsor. The next steps are to review the implementation of the model with the membership at the 2018 U SPORTS Annual Meeting and Conference.

International Business Review

U SPORTS completed a Business Plan Review, with the main objective to propose a sustainable approach to the U SPORTS International program with appropriate strategic alignment over the next four years. Through expert consultation, the current landscape of the international program was examined in the areas of funding, departmental optimization, international relations, membership value and support and future sport education. All key areas were also compared to other FISU global franchise holders to gain a better understanding of the global marketplace for international university sport opportunities. The next steps in the 2018-19 year will be focused around the operational plans to carry out the strategic initiatives established in this Business Plan Review.

Top 10 Moments

With the 2017-18 U SPORTS season officially in the books, it's important to reflect on what was, and ultimately, what makes university sport in Canada so special.

After thousands of regular season and conference playoff games, culminating in 21 national championships, we take a look back at the Top 10 most memorable moments of the past season.



10. Women's soccer: Carabins earn first national title

Heading into nationals, many thought the Quebec team to lift the Gladys Bean Memorial Trophy might be the defending champion Laval Rouge et Or, who went 12-0-2 this season, were ranked No. 1 in the Top 10 each week and entered nationals as the top seed. But Laval was upset in the quarterfinals by the Western Mustangs, and it wound up being the sixth-seeded Montreal Carabins who shone, recovering from their 1-0 overtime loss to the Rouge et Or in the Quebec finals to beat the Guelph Gryphons 1-0 in the national quarterfinals, down the Trinity Western Spartans 5-0 in the semifinals and edge the Cape Breton Capers 1-0 in the final on Nov. 12. Catherine Proulx scored the tournament-winning goal for Montreal and was named match MVP, while keeper Claudia Dubé-Trempe recorded three straight shutouts and defender Marie-Ève Bernard O'Breham was named tournament MVP.



9. Swimming: Varsity Blues' Kylie Masse wins national 50m, 100m and 200m backstroke events for thirdstraight season

Some of the most sustained U SPORTS dominance in recent years has come from Toronto Varsity Blues swimmer Kylie Masse, who won the 50m, 100m and 200m backstroke events at this year's national championships (hosted by the Blues) for the third year in a row, setting U SPORTS records in all three. Masse was named the female Swimmer of the Year for the second straight season, and she picked up five gold and two silver medals overall at the event.

Her Blues finished second to the UBC Thunderbirds (997 points to 1362.5), and UBC also won the men's overall title, but Masse's performance was perhaps the most impressive individual showing. That's especially true considering the incredible consistency she's demonstrated over the last three years.




8. Cross Country: Gaels and Varsity Blues beat 13-time champion Gryphons

The women's cross country world saw a big shakeup this year, first in Ontario and then on the national stage. The Guelph Gryphons had won the last 13 OUA titles and the last 12 national titles, but the Queen's Gaels claimed this year's OUA championship Oct. 28, with the University of Toronto Varsity Blues finishing second. Queen's was led by Branna MacDougall, who placed first overall on the women's side in the 8-kilometre race and was named OUA MVP with a time of 27:19.5. And at the Nov. 12 nationals, the first time that event had been held at an 8-kilometre distance, the Varsity Blues came out on top, with Queen's placing second and Guelph third. Toronto's Sasha Gollish placed first with a time of 27:46 and MacDougall finishing third in 27:51.



7. Men's basketball: Javon Masters sets U SPORTS scoring record

Speaking of impressive historic accomplishments, UNB Varsity Reds fifth-year guard Javon Masters provided one for the ages in January, breaking former Ryerson Rams and Calgary Dinos forward Boris Bakovic's U SPORTS career record of 2,282 regular-season points. Masters hit 2,296 that evening thanks to a 39-point night, leading UNB to a 104-96 win over the Saint Mary's Huskies. He finished with 2,407 regular-season points and was named AUS MVP, then later helped the Varsity Reds win their first conference title since 1967 and advance to nationals. They fell to McGill and Brock there, ending his U SPORTS career, but what a career it was.



6. Women's hockey: Bisons' semifinal shootout sets up title, get recognized by Jets

The Manitoba Bisons won their first women's hockey national championship in March, downing the host Western Mustangs 2-0 in the gold-medal game behind 20 saves from Lauren Taraschuk and goals from Lauryn Keen (named tournament MVP) and Venla Hovi (named game MVP).

But it was how they got there that was perhaps even more notable, as their semifinal game against the Concordia Stingers went to a shootout. Manitoba came up with a 2-1 win there, with Taraschuk making 21 stops during the game and then stopping both shooters she faced in the shootout. Lauren Warkentin scored Manitoba's goal during regulation, while Jordyn Zacharias and Alanna Sharman scored for the Bisons in the shootout. That paved the way for Manitoba to go on and win this title, and then later earn some nice recognition from the Winnipeg Jets.



5. Women's rugby: Gee-Gees best X-Women in Rowan's Legacy match, go on to win national title

The first annual Rowan's Legacy match was played Oct. 7 in Ottawa, part of the Gee-Gees' efforts to honor Rowan Stringer, an Ottawa high school rugby player who had planned to attend the university but died at 17 in 2013 from second impact syndrome after suffering multiple concussions in a short period. The Gee-Gees also announced the creation of a bursary in Stringer's name. And the game itself was a great one, a rematch of the 2016 national final where StFX came out on top. This time around, Ottawa came out with a 33-19 win thanks to a 19-0 run in the second half. Five different players recorded tries for the Gee-Gees, and fifth-year centre Emma Sandström made four of five converts.



4. Women's basketball: Ravens finish perfect season with first title in program history after sneaking by Martlets on Catherine Traer's last-second shot

The Carleton Ravens had a remarkable season this year, going 23-0 in the regular season, rolling through the OUA playoffs and then finding success at the national championships to claim the first title in program history. The Ravens beat the Calgary Dinos 52-42 in the quarterfinals, then barely bested the McGill Martlets 46-44 in the semifinals thanks to an incredible running shot from Catherine Traer with 1.6 seconds left.

That was part of a great comeback from the Ravens, who outscored the Martlets

11-2 in the fourth quarter. And Traer had 10 points, five rebounds and three assists on the night, and went on to put up 21 points and 10 rebounds in Carleton's 69-48 gold-medal win over the Saskatchewan Huskies, which gave the Ravens that first title in team history.



3. Women's volleyball: Rams finish perfect season with first title in school history

Speaking of historic titles, March saw the Ryerson Rams women's volleyball team claim not just the first national title in program history, but their school's first title in any sport. And that also capped off a perfect season, as they went 19-0 in the regular season, 3-0 in the OUA playoffs, and then won all three of their matches at nationals. That included a 25-22, 29-31, 25-19, 25-21 win over the Alberta Pandas in the gold medal game, and that crucial fourth set included Ryerson bouncing back from a 20-17 deficit.

Tournament MVP Theanna Vernon led the way for Ryerson there with 11 kills and 13 blocks, while Janelle Albert had 10 kills and 28 digs and Lauren Veltman had 20 kills and 10 digs.



2. Football: The Dinos' record field goal

There were plenty of great moments in the U SPORTS football playoffs this year, but the Canada West Hardy Cup final on Nov. 11 may have been the most spectacular. A shootout between the Calgary Dinos and UBC Thunderbirds saw UBC leading 43-41 with just two seconds left, and the Dinos a long way out. But they opted to try a field goal anyway, and second-year Calgary kicker Niko DiFonte nailed it from 59 yards out, setting a U SPORTS record and giving the Dinos a 44-43 win.

There was a lot that led up to that, including four fourth-quarter lead changes and a 92-yard UBC touchdown drive inside the final two minutes. But the field goal was particularly special; the previous best in U SPORTS history was a 57-yarder from Saint Mary's Huskies kicker Jerry Foster back in 1986, and there have only been only four field goals from 59 or longer in the CFL's history.



1. Men's basketball: Rams knock off seven-time defending champion Ravens, Dinos make last-second shot to win first-ever title

The men's basketball Final 8 in March saw not one, but two amazing moments. In the semifinals, the Ryerson Rams bested the top-seeded and undefeated Carleton Ravens 84-76, ending Carleton's streak of seven straight national titles. It was yet another clash between these schools, which had faced off for the OUA championship (the Wilson Cup) in each of the past three years, with Ryerson winning in 2016 and 2017 and Carleton winning this year. The teams also faced each other in last year's national title game, with the Ravens taking that one. This time around, though, it was the Rams who wound up on top, boosted by a 28-point, six-assist showing from Manny Diressa.

But, in the title game, it was another program that came up with the trophy, with the Calgary Dinos edging Ryerson 79-77 to win their first national men's basketball title. It was close late, tied at 77 with just nine seconds left in regulation, but then Mambi Diawara stepped up for the Dinos - perhaps the most memorable moment of the U SPORTS season.

Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended March 31, 2018

The mission of U SPORTS (the "Organization") is to enrich the educational experience of the athlete through a national sports program that fosters excellence through quality educational and athletic experience, unity of purpose, respect for autonomy, integrity and fair play, trust and mutual respect, equity and equality of experience.

The Organization is a Registered Canadian Amateur Athletic Association under the Income Tax Act (Canada), and is not subject to income taxes. Effective September 4, 2014, the Organization continued its articles of incorporation under the Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act.

1. Significant accounting policies:

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

(a) Revenue recognition:

The Organization uses the deferral method of accounting for contributions for not-for-profit organizations.

Restricted revenue is recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenditure is incurred.

Unrestricted revenue is recognized as revenue when it is received or becomes receivable.

Membership fees are recognized as revenue in the period in which they become receivable.

(b) Internally restricted RBC (Royal Bank of Canada) student-athlete fund:

The fund will be used as directed by the Board.

(c) Internally restricted reserve:

The reserve was created to provide financial stability for the Organization and is not available for other purposes without approval of the Board of Directors.

(d) Tangible capital assets:

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost less accumulated amortization. Amortization of office furniture and equipment is provided on the straight line basis over five years, computers and computer software is provided on the same basis over three years and amortization of leasehold improvements is provided over the term of the lease.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(e) Sports Canada contributions:

Contributions received from Sport Canada are subject to specific terms and conditions regarding the expenditure of the funds. The Organization's accounting records are subject to audit by Sport Canada to identify instances, if any, in which amounts charged against contributions have not complied with the agreed terms and conditions and which therefore would be refundable to Sport Canada. Adjustments to prior years' contributions are recorded in the year in which Sport Canada requests the adjustment.

Financial instruments: (f)

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value on initial recognition. Equity instruments that are quoted in an active market are subsequently measured at fair value. All other financial instruments are subsequently recorded at cost or amortized cost, unless management has elected to carry the instruments at fair value. The Organization has elected to carry investments at fair value.

Transaction costs incurred on the acquisition of financial instruments measured subsequently at fair value are expensed as incurred. All other financial instruments are adjusted by transaction costs incurred on acquisition and financing costs, which are amortized using the effective interest rate method.

Financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis at the end of the fiscal year if there are indicators of impairment. If there is an indicator of impairment, the Organization determines if there is a significant adverse change in the expected amount or timing of future cash flows from the financial asset. If there is a significant adverse change in the expected cash flows, the carrying value of the financial asset is reduced to the highest of the present value of the expected cash flows, the amount that could be realized from selling the financial asset or the amount the Organization expects to realize by exercising its right to any collateral. If events and circumstances reverse in a future period, an impairment loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement, not exceeding the initial carrying value.

(g) Use of estimates:

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates. These estimates are reviewed annually and as adjustments become necessary, they are recognized in the financial statements in the period they become known.

Line of credit: 4.

The Organization has a line of credit of \$100,000 with a Canadian chartered bank. The line of credit bears interest at prime plus 2.0% per annum. At year-end, the Organization had drawn \$Nil (2017 - \$Nil) on the line of credit.

5. Net assets:

The Organization considers its capital to consist of its unrestricted and internally restricted net assets. The objective of the Organization with respect to its capital is to fund ongoing operations and future projects. The Organization manages its capital by maintaining and monitoring amounts available for future projects, contingencies and other capital requirements.

The Organization is not subject to externally imposed capital requirements and its overall strategy with respect to capital remains unchanged from the year ended March 31, 2017.

7. Economic dependence:

The Organization generates the majority of its revenue from 56 participating Universities in the form of member dues, events and competitions and shared funding arrangements. Future operations of the Organization are dependent upon continued participation of the participating Universities.

8. Financial risk management:

Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Organization will be unable to fulfill its obligations on a timely basis or at a reasonable cost. The Organization manages its liquidity risk by monitoring its operating requirements. The Organization prepares budget and cash forecasts to ensure it has sufficient funds to fulfill its obligations.

The Organization is not subject to significant currency, interest rate or credit risks.

There has been no change to these risk exposures from the year ended March 31, 2017.

9. Comparative information:
